The project is called "Labor Management House 3", and after some initial delays due to building permits the construction started on Saturday, January 8th. Currently, we have basketball and wrestling as our winter sports. To update you on Builder athletics we have the men’s basketball team, currently 3-11. Head coach Bill Tose has seniors Charles Holiday and Curtis Pender leading the team offensively this season. Holiday has 286 points so far for this season. Pender follows him with 235 points. Defensively, Nathan Robinson leads the team with 132 rebounds.

On the women’s side, currently 3-10, head coach Judi Overbey has seniors Tiffany Johnson and Amy Patterson leading the team this season. Tiffany Johnson leads the team with 28 steals so far for the season. Amy Patterson and Whitney Lassiter lead the team in scoring. Patterson has 96 points so far for the season and Lassiter has 111 points. Although they are having tough seasons this year the teams need you to come out and show your support. The men have their last game of the season on February 22nd against Southern Virginia at 6:00 p.m. And the women have their last game of the season on February 14th against Meredith College at 5:00 p.m.

Apprentice Wrestling freshmen, Jon Glavin and Cecil Lee, finished fourth at 133 and 285 pounds respectively. The team finished sixth in the Virginia Division I State Tournament held at the University of Virginia. At the Builder Invitational, The Apprentice School came in second place with a total team score. Brad and Jon Glavin both took first place for their respective weight classes, as did Reuben Russell. Builders Wrestlers, Josh Flint and Eric Lybarger took second place. The last tournament of the season takes place on March 11-12, as the Builders wrestle at the NCWA Nationals.

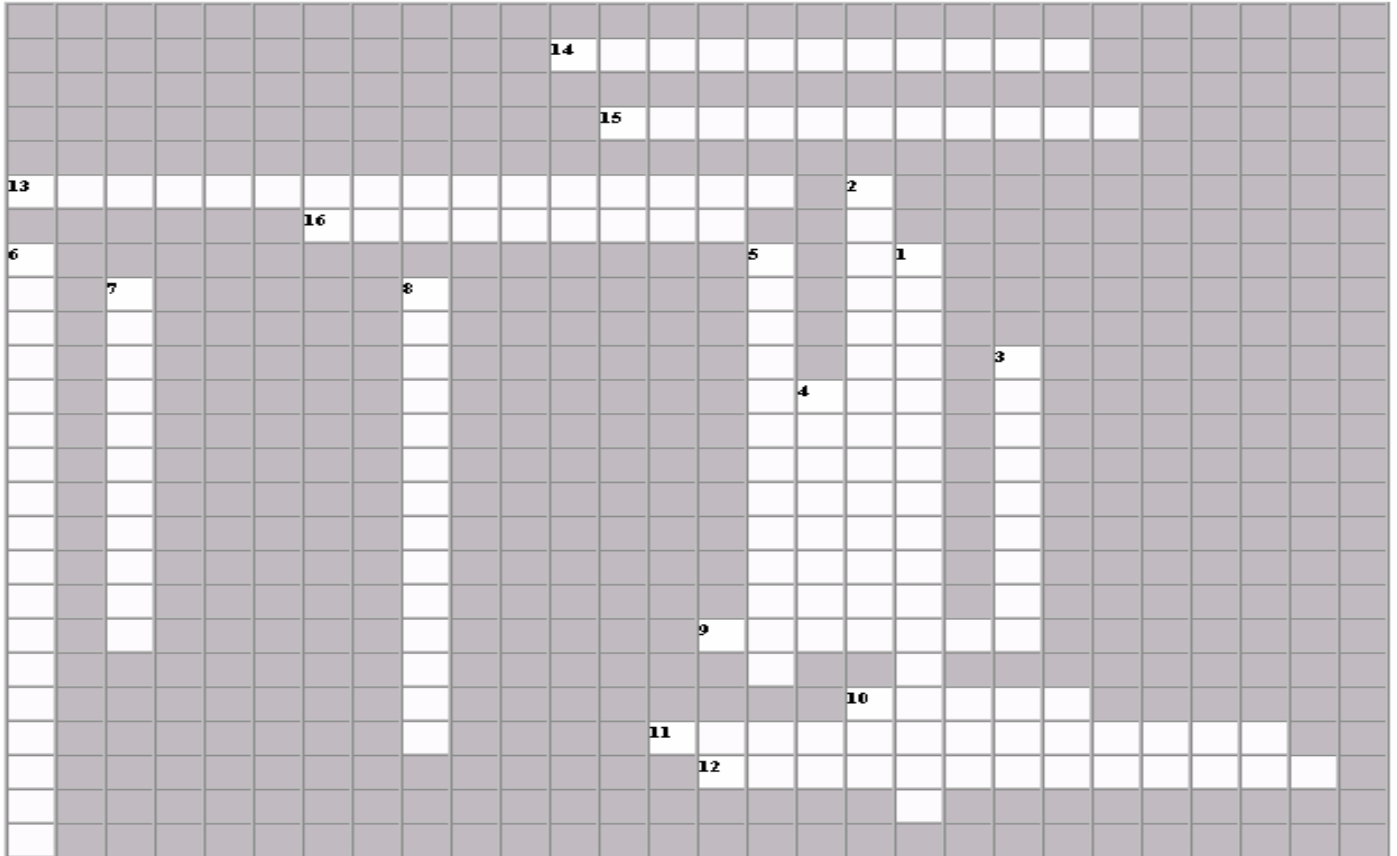
